


“America is a great country.



The Daniel K. Inouye Institute will ensure a fitting tribute to a man whose leadership — as a champion of freedom and fairness — continues to inspire people around the world.

FREEDOM. Whether through his own heroic actions as a member of the famed 442nd Regimental Combat Team, for which he received the Congressional Medal of Honor, or ensuring as Chair of the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee that our nation’s armed forces had the very best to defend democracy and our way of life, Dan Inouye knew that freedom wasn’t free.

FAIRNESS. Dan Inouye spoke for those without a voice, and for whom there was often no place at the table. He gave voice to Native Americans, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiians. He did the same for Japanese Americans and Filipino World War II veterans, and called upon our great nation to recognize past injustices and make amends. He was a stalwart supporter of Israel, knowing it was in America’s best interest.

Senator Dan Inouye was regularly called upon to tackle difficult tasks where moral courage and bipartisan leadership were essential: as the first Chair of the Senate Committee on Intelligence, member of the Watergate Committee, and Chair of the Iran-Contra Investigative Committee. He executed each assignment with a quiet dignity, steadfast resolve, and an unwavering hope for the future.

The Daniel K. Inouye Institute will work with affiliated organizations to:

PRESERVE Senator Inouye’s papers in collaboration with the University of Hawai‘i and the Library of Congress.

- ◆ A new facility on the University of Hawai‘i’s Mānoa campus will house the senator’s papers and scholarly work, and serve as a locus for community outreach and education.
- ◆ A joint research fellowship and lecture series at the Library of Congress will focus on topics of national and international interest.
- ◆ Archivists will catalogue historical documents and engage in relevant research.
- ◆ An oral history project will encapsulate the senator’s story through the voices of colleagues, staff, national and international leaders, and the people of Hawai‘i.
- ◆ An accomplished biographer will complete the second book Dan Inouye started as a follow-up to his *Journey to Washington*.



SUPPORT Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics (STEM) education, civics learning, and international educational-cultural exchanges.

- ◆ A collective STEM initiative will bring together K-12 and post-secondary programs that the senator helped to establish, including internships in the workplace.
- ◆ A civics-based curriculum will offer lessons about leadership based on the senator’s life story as well as insights into the democratic process.
- ◆ International educational-cultural exchanges will increase understanding and tolerance between U.S. students and students of our allies, with special focus on “Inouye Fellows” in Japan, Israel, and the Philippines.

ESTABLISH a partnership between the Smithsonian Institution and the Bishop Museum to serve as a repository and interpreter of the Asian American/Pacific experience, and to share contributions in the fields of astronomy, ocean and natural sciences.
