Aloha Friends,

With Thanksgiving just a few days away, we are grateful for your support and friendship, as we emerge from the pandemic. The opportunity to gather once again has been particularly meaningful.

Following in the footsteps of his father, who traveled in 1959 to pay homage to his ancestral homeland, Ken, Jessica and Maggie Inouye visited Yame City in Fukuoka, Japan in late October. Senator was the oldest of four children of Hyotaro and Kame Inouye. His father Hyotaro lived in Yame City until he immigrated as a child with his parents to Hawaii aboard the S.S. City of Peking on July 24, 1899. The family came to work in the sugarcane plantation on Kauai, to help pay back a debt the family owed in their village. Hyotaro would send funds back to his family in Yame.





During their visit, Ken, Jessica and Maggie visited with distant relatives, paid their respects at family gravesites with relative Kazue Inoue who is 83 years old. Ken commented, "They had to leave such a beautiful and quiet place because of a fire. I always wanted to visit here." Maggie said, "It's an honor to be able to see and know my roots."

From Fukuoka, the family traveled to Tokyo. Ken joined Jennifer Hirano, daughter of the late Irene Hirano Inouye at the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo. On July 24, 2021, First Lady Jill Biden dedicated the Irene Hirano Inouye and Daniel K. Inouye Room at the residence of the U.S. Ambassador in Tokyo. Due to COVID, Ken and Jennifer joined the event via video. During the trip last month, they were able to visit and see it in person - a very special moment.





The DKI Institute once again partnered with the Hawaii Independent Film Festival (HIFF), together with the Ted Stevens Foundation, for the Future Filmmakers program which invited young filmmakers (grades 6th to 12th) in Hawaii and Alaska to reflect on their own cultural traditions and to create a short film that would "Honor the Past to Build the Future." There were 40 submissions, with 26 selected as Finalists.

During the luncheon, certificates and awards were presented by Ken and Maggie Inouye, along with Auli'I, and Jen May Pastores from HIFF. Aulii graciously answered questions from the student filmmakers as she shared tidbits of her own journey. She then took endless pictures with the students – a heartwarming gathering was enjoyed by all.
